Project Origins

- Student practicum as means to explore interest in UX
- UX as uniquely exciting avenue for advancing DEIA
- Experience on reference desk
- Background in Gender Studies
- Current cultural and political forces in US

Library Context

- Only three all-gender facilities in the Main Library
 - One is wheelchair-accessible
 - Inconveniently located—need directions
 - Lack some basic amenities
 - All single-stall/single-user
- Other libraries on campus lack allgender facilities entirely

- Draft memo to Library admin
- Implement feedback

UX Instruments

Photojournaling


- Users directed to take photos of bathroom spaces, annotate them, and submit online
- Open to all

"I like / I wish / What if" prompts

- Users asked to complete prompts and submit responses online
- Open to all

Focus groups

- Addressed safety, visibility, accessibility, hygiene, etc.
- Feedback on images of existing all-gender bathrooms
- Two focus groups restricted to TGNC folks



User Feedback

SHORT-TERM

- Improve discoverability of all-gender restrooms
- Offer free menstrual products in all bathrooms
- Add occupancy indicators
- Simplify signage
- Improve general cleanliness

LONG-TERM

- Create more all-gender bathrooms in more convenient locations
- Address accessibility concerns
- Change infrastructure to increase privacy

Overarching Themes



BURDEN ON TGNC PATRONS

- Potential for conflict
- Planning daily routines around bathroom access



BATHROOM CONFIGURATIONS

- Varied preferences
- Multi-stall all-gender
- Single-stall allgender



PROJECT LIMITATIONS

- Focus on bathrooms at expense of other spaces
- Constraints on addressing user input

Navigating Pushback

- Feedback from anonymous transphobic participants
 - Stereotypes and cultural falsehoods about trans people
 - Criticism of the project's existence
- Contacted by conservative reactionary organizations
 - Importance of library DEIA policies
- User experience vs. user oppression
